We filled pot holes on Danville St and Smith St, Pickup backhoe and buckets from Joe Wise's shop. Started cutting trees on Smith St by Andy's garage getting ready to dig Ditch (per Engineer), Graded south side looking for storm sewers if there is one the rain will open it up (per Engineer), trapped 3 ground hogs I coon dropped off at Red Bridge, rewired police garage, put up 4 new lights and new breaker box, grading Kelly Ave getting ready to dig ditch on south side and install 5 new culvert for water to drain to storm sewer, we need to get this done before Westville resurfaces the road from Shaw St to the top of E Kelly Ave, (per Engineer approx. cost is \$1800.00, 10" black pipe @ \$5.34 per ft need 120 ft, 2 loads of road pack approx. 30 ton cost \$615.00), resealed the city hall roof, going on vacation June 14 to 25, FYI, by the state of IL, there is no such thing as a Backhoe License, and by the state of IL, there is no state license for electrician, it is a city or Village ordinance.



### The Year 1908 How the Village Got Started

Once upon a time there was a town in Illinois, called Westville. IL and about 1896 they wanted to be called a town so they went to the



Vermilion County court house and with 37 names out of 370, they petition to name their little town Westville. The name that they chose was after one of the first settlers that came to settle in the early years of 1800. After being a city for about 10 years they incorporated all the ground from the Kellyville Street to Lyon road and Smith St. The people in



that part of town were mostly French and Belgium and that is when things got hot.

The people were not allowed to run in the elections or if they did there was not enough people in that end of town to get the elected, also that part of town was not fixed up or could not get any help from the people of Westville to fix it up, so a group of men from this section of Westville went and annexed out of Westville and called there town Belgium, I guess they were more Belgium then French men so that is why they called it Belgium.

Danville Wettes of Wet one, and the voters declared the township to be wet, but Westville, in Georgetown Township voted dry, and some of Westville rand to the township dividing lines. A "wet" spot developed. There were two saloons in the wet township; owners were Vic Van devoir and William Hamilton. Thirty six taverns in Westville had to go. Prices on land in the wet area soared, when the vote was known, especially in an area known as Kellyville. Saloon keepers were expected to swarm into the area, including brewers, from Terre Haute, IN, with interest here. It seems there was a need for a town without the new restriction on hours of taverns operating; apparently the news of the new village's petition didn't get around too well.

This suggestion was put forth in the April 9 issue of the paper: A New Corporation may arise with revenue derived from the liquor sales.... A police force and fire department could be organized... in the wet area. The Danville Paper reported daily events of the controversial area. A wrestler named the Belgium Terror was active in Westville bouts. An advertisement in the paper harped on the Lyons Big 4 shops subdivision on the southern border of Danville Township just north of Kellyville. An April 20 issue old of drunks in the city jail in Danville after arrests on city streets. They had gone to Westville for their refreshments on Sunday as Danville Taverns were supposed to close them. Danville City council was discussing rear or back entrances to taverns and H C Patterson justice of the peace and jury had acquitted a city saloon keeper of being open on Sunday. The corporation petition in county court was reported in the paper. It said the town to be was commonly known as Garlic town and O'Connellsville and was just north of Westville. Residents of the area were supposed to be mostly of Belgian's and French backgrounds and wonder was being express over a name for the town. An attorney presenting the court petition denied to the newspaper that the town was wanted for town in the wet Danville Township.


